During the week we the year 4 & 5 children went through the process of selecting the 2019 Student leadership Team. With this in mind I'd like to share some information about leadership which is relevant to us all because we all take on leadership roles in our lives.

Some children and adults seem to have that a natural personality that inspires others to

follow their lead, however, the ingredients of true leadership aren't really a mystery. Many people have researched and studied the qualities that leaders possess, and they have observed many commonalities.

If children are aspiring to take on a leadership role at school, or if they simply wish to have more influence in their circles of friends and classmates, encourage them to begin building the characteristics of a Leader today.

Andrew J. DuBrin has identified many of these characteristics in his book. Here's a quick summary of the traits he recounts:

- **Self confidence.** Per DuBrin, "A leader who is self-assured without being bombastic or overbearing instills self-confidence in team members." *Your self-confidence and calm demeanor can help others feel more certain that they, too, can overcome hurdles or reach a challenging goal.*
- **Humility.** When you're willing to share credit with others, and you're willing to admit that you're not perfect, others see that and appreciate it.
- **Core self-evaluations.** Research shows that four related self-perceptions relate to effective leadership: "self-esteem, locus of control, that is, taking responsibility for what happens in your life, self-efficacy, akin to self-confidence, and emotional Stability."

From the Principal cont'd.....

- **Trustworthiness.** People trust you when your attitudes, words, and motives align with what you actually choose to do. This includes being honest about mistakes, refusing to gossip and shift blame, and doing things the ethical way, even if it's more expedient to do otherwise.
- **Authenticity.** Be yourself, and act in line with your core values and personality. *People will notice if you're trying to be someone other than who you really are.*
- **Extraversion.** Most leaders maintain an outgoing demeanor, show an interest in people, and gladly participate in group or team activities. If you feel that you're not naturally extraverted, you can work on your skills by making a conscious effort to demonstrate genuine curiosity about and friendliness toward others.
- **Assertiveness.** Be up front about your needs, concerns, and opinions, but, don't forget to be tactful!
- **Enthusiasm, optimism, and warmth.** Staying positive, being approachable, and expressing positive thoughts and feelings through both verbal and nonverbal communication help you build rapport with those around you.
- **Sense of humor.** Your ability to make people laugh can help others feel comfortable and relieve tense situations.

In addition to these general personality traits, DuBryn also lists several task-related personality traits common to leaders:

- **Passion.** Leaders show an extremely strong commitment to and enthusiasm about their work.
- **Emotional intelligence.** A solid leader exhibits empathy towards others, has a good understanding of emotions – both others' and their own – and recognizes that their own mood can have an effect on the entire organization's performance.
- **Flexibility and adaptability.** A leader can bring about change, so it follows that he or she must also be ready and willing to adjust to different settings and situations.
- **Internal locus of control.** Strong leaders take responsibility for events and believe that they can have an effect on outcomes and conditions.
- **Courage.** Willingness to take risks on new ideas may put you "out there" for criticism and blame... but it also carries the reward of bringing new ideas to fruition.

Through awareness of what it takes to be a leader, you can begin building habits that lead to increased effectiveness.

Other researchers promote the following skills as important in developing student leaders:

- **Communication Skills.** This includes cooperation, problem-solving and listening skills. In addition, students learn how to deal with conflict situations.
- **Social Awareness Skills.** Students learn how to consider other people's opinions and show empathy.
- **Emotional Management Skills.** The students learn how to manage stress and motivate themselves to work towards particular goals.
- **Self-Awareness Skills.** Throughout the process of collaborating, students learn how to identify and express their own feelings.
- **Decision-Making Skills.** When students work in a group, they have to make reasonable choices that everyone agrees with.

In acknowledging our current year 6 students, and as they move onto high school, we reflect on the times when we saw see these qualities and virtues in the the children as they continue to develop into the leaders of the future.

During November, the month of All Souls, let us continue to pray for loved ones.

By tradition, the Catholic Church dedicates each month of the year to a certain devotion. In November, it is the Holy Souls in Purgatory, those faithful Christians who have died and gone before us but who still must atone for their sins. The church teaches that the time they spend in Purgatory

cleanses them so that they may enter Heaven free from all effects of sin.

Praying for the dead, especially for those we have known, is a part of our Christian charity. Our own prayers and sacrifices can be offered up to relieve their suffering. Many prayers can be incorporated into our daily prayers during the month of November. One of the most commonly recited of Catholic prayers in times past is the Eternal Rest Prayer. This prayer has fallen into disuse in the last few

decades. Prayer for the dead, however, is one of the greatest acts of charity we can perform, for loved ones, to help them during their time in Purgatory.

Reflection on the Gospel

'Of all the ways in which our Lord could have contrasted his kingdom with all the other ways in which societies are ruled, he chose a contrast about the use of force.

Rather, his reign springs from his Father's will that humanity should live together in a realm of non-violence.

We could pause for a moment to pray for the coming of the Kingdom, in the words of the Our Father: 'Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done *on earth as it is in heaven.*' **(Michael Tate)**

Christ's kingdom is a kingdom of truth and life, of holiness and grace, of justice and love and peace. We need not stand at a distance from him, afraid to approach because of our human vulnerability. He is the one who loved us so much that he handed himself over to suffering and death so that we might live. He has already brought us to birth in this kingdom through Baptism and he has taught us how to live in it. Today we look to that time when his glory will be revealed, when we will all be gathered into the embrace of God, there to sing praise to that glory forever.

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Gospel Focus – Truth

Jesus says to Pilate that he came into the world '**to bear witness to the truth**; and all who are on the side of truth listen to my voice.' That is where today's gospel passage finishes but as the gospel continues on, Pilate famously asks Jesus 'What is truth?' and the question is left dangling; unanswered.

The truth Jesus has borne witness to is the truth of his whole life – the revelation of God's love for humanity. It is for proclaiming this truth that Jesus is placed on trial and is brought before Pilate.


CHANGES TO CELEBRATION OF LEARNING

War Memorial Recount:

On Sunday the 11th of November, an important day in Australia came around. It was Remembrance Day.

We gathered to celebrate the Centenary of the end of WWI, when the Armistice was signed to call off the fighting to end the war. It was the 100th Anniversary and people from all around the Penrith area came to celebrate and remember the soldiers that fought and defended this country. During the gathering, we marched and had a minute of silence to pay respects.

School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) 2019 applications now open

School student applications for 2019 open from Monday, 15 October 2018.

Students progressing to year 3 and year 7 **do not** need to re-apply **if** they:

- are continuing at the same school
- are residing at the same address
- have not been sent an expiry notification from Transport for NSW

Where a student meets the new distance eligibility, the system will automatically update their entitlement. If they do not meet the new eligibility, they will receive an expiry notification.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition which is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

Term Bus Pass holders will receive a notification to re-apply.

If students need to update their information or re-apply, they should go online to <https://apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts/updateDetails>

Applications need to be submitted before 31 December 2018 to ensure student entitlements are updated and their current entitlement/card is not cancelled. If their application is submitted after 31 December 2018, the system will automatically cancel a card and a new one will need to be issued.

Students in the Opal network applying for a SSTS or Term Bus Pass entitlement for the first time will receive their card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out during December 2018 and January 2019.

Students residing in Rural and Regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the commencement of the new school year from their nominated operator. **Note:** some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students should check with their operator for more information.
