The tourist was astonished. These enormous animals could at any time break free but because they believed they couldn’t, they were stuck right where they were.


How many of us, like the elephants, go through life believing that we cannot do something, simply because of something that we thought we learned when we were young?

Safe Respectful Learners

“Kids have no respect for anything these days.”

This appears to be an expression from some adults but it is
NOT TRUE.

The notion of respect continues to be the basis of civil behaviour. Those children and young people who act respectfully toward others have a huge advantage over their peers in terms of social acceptance and cooperative work skills.



Showing respect means that a child protects the basic human rights of others to safety and fair treatment. The most basic way to show respect for others is by the use of good manners. In fact, manners are ‘respect in action’.

The use of good manners is the most important social skill that adults can teach children. Manners help children navigate effectively through their social world and also help them influence others. Good manners begins with the use of ‘please’, ‘thank you’ and calling people by name. It extends to an array of social conventions, including: how to eat in public, how to win and lose gracefully and how to answer a telephone call.

Sometimes adults need to insist that children treat us in respectful ways. That means that we don’t respond to disrespectful treatment. So if a child yells at his mother to get some food a wise parent would remind that child that cooperation only comes with respectful treatment. We need to teach children that treating others inappropriately is not the way to get their needs met.

Respect also needs to extend to the treatment of the environment. It is reasonable to expect children to treat their home, their neighbourhood, their school and the natural environment in ways that ensures that they are protected and preserved.

Self-respect is also important for children. When they treat themselves respectfully they tend to be more careful about how they allow others to behave towards them as well as being mindful of how they treat their minds and bodies. Respect when shown for others, self and the environment is the basic value for all successful interactions in a civil society. It is definitely a value that parents should preach and live by.



From the Assistant Principal's desk...

Welcome to my desk. In each Newsletter I will provide general information, ideas and tips for parents in all key Learning Areas. If you have a particular question or query or anything you would like more information about, please let me know.



At Our Lady of the Rosary, we focus upon understanding assessment as an opportunity for students to show what they **CAN** do. When we think about assessment in this way, it is about celebrating growth and identifying next steps for learning.

This week, I'd like to frame the upcoming NAPLAN tests as another opportunity to celebrate learning growth – and provide some information about the 2021 online NAPLAN tests.

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assesses literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life. Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in the annual NAPLAN tests in reading, writing, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. The assessment provides parents and schools with an understanding of how individual students are performing at the time of the tests.

We moved to online NAPLAN testing in 2019. The 2020 programme did not take place due to COVID-19, and in 2021, like the majority of students across Australia, all students in Years 3 and 5 at OLR will sit *NAPLAN online*.

NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process – it does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance and it is not used for formal semester reporting.

It is extremely important to talk positively about this experience with your child, as they do not need to feel anxious or worried. The school will provide a supportive environment where the children will complete the tests in smaller groups with many teachers on hand to help them through the process.



One of the main benefits of NAPLAN online is its capacity to deliver tailored testing, where the test automatically adapts to an individual student's test performance by presenting questions of higher or lower complexity. This allows all students to work at their own point of challenge and allows the test to measure student achievement more precisely.

The assessment window for 2021 NAPLAN online is between 11 and 21 May (Term 2 Weeks 4 and 5).

Students in Years 3 will hand write their writing test on Tuesday May 11th; they will use School devices and **self supplied headphones**, in their own classrooms, to complete the other tests. Students in Year 5 will use School devices and **self supplied headphones** to complete all tests. The School will ensure all devices are set up with the software required for the testing and Specialist IT support will be available during all testing windows. The students have had Practice opportunities in classroom settings during Term 1 and into this term.

It is very important that students **ATTEND SCHOOL** and are **ON TIME** on these days. If a child is absent for a test, they **MUST** complete the one they missed first and then the next one. They have to be completed in the prescribed order.
